APPROVAL OF MINUTES - August 28, 2006 Regular Meeting and Closed Session Minutes

Moved by Jay Newman, second by Barbara Camp to approve the Minutes as written. During roll call vote all four Committee members present voted in the affirmative.

REPORT OF GOVERNING BODY MEMBERS

Frank Conrad, reported on the Boy Scouts Tuckahoe River Cleanup event this past weekend. The event was well attended with over 1 ton of garbage collected by the troop. This event was possible with a grant from the Great Egg Harbor Wild and Scenic River Association.

Mr. Conrad reported that the train stop for the Shoreline Train Museum has been completed. Also, that Boy Scout Arron Segan will construct a train platform at this stop, as an Eagle Scout project. There are also plans for a tent and garden area there. He asked that Township Engineer Paul Dietrich, and Construction Official Edward Kenney, to aid in the design and construction of this project where needed.

He reported on the football games this past weekend in that all four teams reported wins with all the cheerleading teams in full swing and cheering at each game. All games were well attended by the public.

Barbara Camp, reported that Road Dept. crews worked on clearing all the storm drains in Strathmere as requested by members of Strathmere Improvement Association attending the last meeting. Also, trash was collected on the Monday holiday in Strathmere, along with 56.7 tons of storm debris. She reported on the tons of trash dumped at the MUA by Upper Township this past month with 40.8% recycling, and that the Sanitary Inspector has been

active in instructing the public on trash disposal requirements. Other accomplishments for this month included 339 miles of Township streets have been swept, the restrooms and kitchen area at Amanda's Field have been completed, the storage facility at the Community Center is near completion, and the "No Parking" signs have been installed in Strathmere. She reported on repairs made at the bulkhead in Strathmere.

Jay Newman, reported that the Rescue Squad answered over 120 calls in August. The recent storm had all Fire Companies out most of the night with power outages of 6-8 hours on Stagecoach Road due to the high winds.

He discussed amending the Skate Park Ordinance to allow the Committee to set the fee schedule by resolution and to not require a park attendant during park hours. This would allow the park to be more accessible to residents. Mr. Young asked that written approval from the Joint Insurance Fund be obtained prior to any decision.

He moved to hire Scott Guntz as a part time skate park attendant. Applicant has met the finger print requirement. Curtis Corson seconded motion with all four Committee members present voting in the affirmative.

Curtis Corson, Deputy Mayor, reported that the Township has received the 2nd state aid check this week.

OTHER REPORTS

Wanda Gaglione, Municipal Clerk, read a letter from the Tax Collector into the record informing the Committee that the Tax Sale will be held on November 28, 2006 at 10:00 A.M. at the Township Hall. The Tax Collector also requested that the Committee appoint a Township official to bid at the sale. Patricia Garbutt, Finance Officer and/or Megan McAfee, Tax Assessor were appointed. Confirming resolution will be scheduled for the next meeting.

Daniel Young, Municipal Attorney, discussed that Seaville Fire Company are refinancing some outstanding debt and need a resolution of approval from the Township Committee. The resolution will make clear that the Township is not taking any obligation in this debt. However, the financing company requires a resolution. Motion by Jay Newman, second by Barbara Camp to adopt a resolution at the next meeting; during roll call vote three Committee members voted in the affirmative, Curtis Corson abstained.

Paul Dietrich, Municipal Engineer, discussed installing air conditioning in the trash compactor cabs with remaining budget funds. The weather this summer made the absence of air conditioning in the vehicles very difficult for the drivers. He received quotes from Campbell Freightliner. Motion was made by Barbara Camp, second by Jay Newman to proceed with the installation on two vehicles and re-budget for the others. During roll call vote all four Committee members present voted in the affirmative.

He also discussed repairing the sinkholes at the bulkhead at Sumner and Whittier, as recommended by the Strathmere Improvement Association. Mr. Dietrich received quotes from Gibson and Associates in the amount of \$5800 each, in addition to permitting fees. Gibson proposal A and B were discussed and accepted. Motion to accept proposals A & B by Jay Newman, second by Barbara Camp. During roll call vote all four Committee members present voted in the affirmative. Resolution will be placed on the next meeting's agenda.

5. Resolution opposing the transportation of the neutralized VX nerve agent known as VX Hydrolysate through New Jersey to Salem County.

RE: RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE TRANSPORTATION OF THE
NEUTRALIZED VX NERVE AGENT KNOWN AS VX HYDROLYSATE
THROUGH NEW JERSEY TO SALEM COUNTY**

WHEREAS, DuPont is proposing to transport the neutralized VX Nerve Agent known as VX hydrolysate through New Jersey to Salem County, treat the VX hydrolysate at the DuPont facility in Deepwater, New Jersey and dispose of VX hydrolysate into the Delaware River; and

WHEREAS, VX hydrolysate is highly caustic and could be harmful to humans and materials; and

WHEREAS, it is possible that under the right conditions (if the pH were decreased below the 13 to 14 range) VX Nerve Agent could be reformed from VX hydrolysate; and

WHEREAS, the organic layer in VX hydrolysate is flammable; therefore VX hydrolysate must be kept sealed from the environment at all times; and

WHEREAS, one of the byproducts of the destruction process, EA2192 is nearly as toxic as VX and is the most toxic degradation product from VX hydrolysis, and has a half-life 3,700 times greater than that of VX, compounding chronic impacts when discharged or released; and

WHEREAS, there are no bioassay toxicity data for EA2192 which retains its anticholinesterase (nerve-agent) activities and therefore is a potential toxic threat to aquatic life; and

WHEREAS, little is known about most VX hydrolysis degradation products – the products result from neutralizing VX as proposed; and

WHEREAS, there do not appear to be any studies on the impacts of the destruction byproducts of MPA, EMPA or EA2192 on the environment or aquatic resources, the toxicity effects of these chemical compounds needs research as all three compounds may be present in the discharge that enters the Delaware River as a result of DuPont’s proposed treatment method and the fact that DuPont claims that the levels of these compounds will be non-detect does not guarantee that they will not be present below the detect limit; and

WHEREAS, the disposal of the byproducts of VX hydrolysate may negatively impact the farming, fishing, blue crab and oyster industries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Upper, in the County of Cape May and State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The Township Committee opposes the transportation to and treatment of the neutralized VX hydrolysate in New Jersey for disposal into the Delaware River and requests assistance from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection in preventing this project from moving forward.

WHEREAS, Pepco Holdings Inc. and its subsidiary Atlantic City Electric have reached an agreement for the sale of the B.L. England Generating station, located in Beesley’s Point, Upper Township, Cape May County, New Jersey, to R.C. Cape May Holdings, LLC an affiliate of Rockland Capital Energy Investments, LLC; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee of the Township of Upper has been apprised of certain conditions of the sale primarily that the buyer will assume all environmental liabilities associated with the site and operation of the site, and that the plant will continue operating as a generating plant; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee is of the opinion that the sale of the B. L. England Generating Station to another power generating entity is in the best interest of this municipality and essential to the well being of the economy of the Township of Upper as well as all of Cape May County; and

WHEREAS, the sale of the B.L. England Generating Station to another power generating entity and its continued operation will ensure adequate generating capacity and reliability at a time when there are increased demands on same given the growth in Cape May and Atlantic Counties; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Upper, in the County of Cape May and State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The allegations of the preamble are incorporated herein by this reference.
2. The Township Committee acknowledges and accepts the conditions of the sale; they are that the buyer will assume all environmental liabilities associated with the site and operation of the site, and that the plant will continue operating as a generating plant.
3. The Township Committee acknowledges that this sale is subject to the approval of the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the United States Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.
4. The Township Committee hereby supports the sale of the B.L. England Generating Plant to R.C. Cape May Holdings, LLC an affiliate of Rockland Capital Energy Investments, LLC.
