It is a critical part of FEMA’s overarching mission to support citizens and first responders to ensure that as a Nation, we work together to build, sustain, and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from, and mitigate all hazards.

Prepareathon will now be held on September 15th to coincide with NPM. It is a national community-based campaign that enables individuals to actively participate in preparedness activities. Prepareathon events are unique to each community and may be aligned to the 2017 NPM 2017 weekly themes:

Prepareathon promotes an understanding of the actions that can be taken to prepare for emergencies and be aware of safety tips and protective actions that are essential before or during a disaster. The whole community is encouraged to participate while strengthening local, regional, and national networks of like-minded and committed community members. Best practices, technical expertise, and experience can be shared among members to create awareness and expand the capacity to become champions for preparedness.

Individual and Community Preparedness

The Community Preparedness Intern will work under the supervision of the Community Preparedness Officer and/or the Integration Branch Chief, the intern will provide research, planning, and development of a series of preparedness programs. This graduate or undergraduate level internship will provide the student with an opportunity to gain experience in the Federal Government, Emergency Management, Community Development, and Partnership Coordination. The Community Preparedness Intern will also support the Community Preparedness Officer to plan, initiate, coordinate and execute the development of a Higher Education Preparedness Network, which will meet the needs of Region II states NJ and NY to build and support successful preparedness efforts.

Continuity of Operations

The Intern will support the Continuity Manager to help coordinate and manage the continuity of operations program for Federal, State level (New Jersey, New York, Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands) and tribal, local governments within Region II states. The intern will help the Continuity Specialists build continuity programming between FEMA and the Continuity of Operations Working Groups (CWG) and will help organize, manage and facilitate training and exercise events, write policy papers, evaluate programs, develop plans, conduct outreach, instruct classes help identify gaps or weaknesses in pandemic and cyber security planning policies procedures and attend meetings.

Requirements

- (1) Interns **MUST** be enrolled in a Graduate School or Undergraduate School in their Junior/Senior year.
- (2) Previous work or ongoing study at bachelor's level in public health, liberal arts, business, public administration, communications, training, economics, emergency management or public relations.
- (3) Interns must be United States Citizens only (green card holders or those with student visas/work permits are not allowed).
- (4) Accepted Interns must complete a background investigation and suitability of employment prior to start date (this process can take 4-6 weeks or longer).

A Long Term Power Outage (LTPO) event can be caused by a myriad of events and can result in catastrophic economic losses and deaths. Without efficient and timely fuel delivery hospitals, nursing homes, and other public health facilities may be unable to care for their patients. Coupled with the lack of potable water and sewer services, infectious diseases could become a primary threat.

In response to this threat, on August 9th, 2017, FEMA Region II in partnership with the Caribbean Area Division co-hosted a discussion based workshop focusing on the effects of a long-term power outage caused by a cyber-attack against the electrical grid system. Participants from the private sector, non-profit, local and federal government discussed strategies on how to execute their essential functions and maintain operation during a long-term power outage in Puerto Rico.



Also on August 9th, FEMA Region II and the Caribbean Area Division co-hosted an active shooter workshop at American University. The workshop provided attendees with a platform to expand upon public safety and continuity plans and discuss the unique challenges of preventing, responding to, and recovering from a complex coordinated attack on a college or university. Complex coordinated terrorist attacks are acts of terrorism that involve synchronized and independent team(s) at multiple locations with no warning and employing one or more weapon systems, such as firearms, explosives, fire as a weapon, and other non-traditional attack methodologies (i.e. vehicles, mass stabbings) which are intended to result in large numbers of casualties. The workshop received approximately 60 attendees from the community.

Resilient Workplace COOP Workshop

In light of recent events around the world, preparing for an active shooter incident is more important now than ever before. While we have all spent a considerable amount of time preparing for the response to an active shooter incident, FEMA and the Buffalo FEB would like to invite you to participate in a workshop to examine how, not only how we would respond to such an event, but also what challenges you may encounter recovering from it.

On **September 7, 2017**, the Buffalo FEB in partnership with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, will be hosting the Resilient Workplace COOP Workshop. The workshop will be held from 0830 to 1530 in Room 423, 130 South Elmwood Avenue. We invite your agency to attend this facilitated discussion on topics such as initial response actions, communication, human resources, continuity of operations, and public relations.

The workshop will consist of three modules:

1. Initial Actions.
2. Continuity of Operations.
3. Long-term Recovery Challenges.

The format will be consist of informational presentations, case studies, and a scenario-based discussion.

Exercise Design Course

FEMA Region II will be conducting training for emergency exercise design and evaluation (a combination of FEMA Courses I-120 and L-146). The course is a 4 day program which focuses on the design phase of the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP).

Course details:

Emergency managers, emergency services personnel, and other individuals who are part of the emergency preparedness and response or continuity of operations need to be able to use the fundamentals of exercise simulation and design as an integrated system of resources and capabilities. Skills learned during this program will enable jurisdictions to conduct NIMS required exercises.

The course will develop emergency response and continuity exercise skills in the following areas:

- Exercise programs
- Exercise design steps
- Exercise evaluation
- Designing a functional exercise
- Exercise process
- Tabletop, functional and full scale exercises
- Exercise enhancements

The course will conclude with students conducting and evaluating actual tabletop and functional exercises in a group/team environment.

Volunteers Needed Virtual Workshop for Houses of Worship

In an attempt to broaden our reach with preparedness workshops and training, FEMA Region II is seeking your help with rolling out a Virtual Workshop series. It is envisioned that the virtual workshop approach will link various communities together from around the Region to learn, exchange lessons learned and best practices, and to strengthen their abilities to respond to and recover from various disasters.

The first virtual workshop topic will be **Active Shooter Incident for Houses of Worship**, and we are seeking organizations to volunteer to be a part of the first delivery to provide us with feedback.

What is a “House of Worship”?: For the purposes of these discussions, we would define a House of Worship as any public or private facility used for religiously-sponsored activities at the time of an incident. This includes commercial properties used as houses of worship at the time of the incident. Examples include, but are not limited to, churches, temples, synagogues, mosques, and related religious gathering and retreat facilities.

Participation is envisioned of perhaps 4 or 5 people, or even more if your organization is motivated.

FEMA Region II Preparedness Webinar: Preparedness Planning for Senior Citizen Communities

Description: The senior citizen population faces several unique challenges, coupled with the fact that many are often dependent upon others for basic necessities and psychosocial support. This dependency often increases their vulnerability to the impacts of major disasters, when not only are the seniors themselves impacted, but these critical services are also disrupted. Currently, 46.2 million people in the United States are 65 years old or older, with that number expected to increase each year. This population demographic made up 13.3% of the population in the 2011 Census. The ability to recover from an emergency tomorrow often depends on planning and preparation done today. This webinar will provide to older individuals and their caregivers, as well as to the local agencies who serve them, tools and information to assist them in assessing their needs and vulnerabilities so they can be better prepared to cope with emergencies.

Speakers: **Ms. Kathleen Otte** is the Regional Administrator for HHS Regions I and II for the U.S. Administration for Community Living (ACL). In this capacity, she represents the Administration and the Assistant Secretary on Aging on all matters related to the implementation of the Older Americans Act (OAA) and other aging related issues within the 8 states and 2 territories she oversees. Prior to joining AoA, Kathleen served as the Director of the Bureau of Elderly and Adult Services for the State of New Hampshire. Kathleen and the New Hampshire team designed and implemented a caregiver support program that received national distinction by winning the Regional Innovation Award from The Council of State Governments and developed the nation's first statewide 'Structured Decision Making' process for Adult Protective Services.

Kathleen has over 30 years' experience in the field of aging, having served or volunteered in various human service delivery programs. In 2014, Kathleen received the Spirit of Jane Addams Award for Outstanding Performance in Social Justice from Be the Evidence, International for her work with Elder Justice Initiatives.

Rhonda Schwartz is an Aging Services Program Specialist within the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services Administration for Community Living. Rhonda is assigned to the Regional Office located in Boston, MA, where she works with federal, state and tribal organizations in the region, with particular attention to oversight of the Older Americans Act state and tribal grant programs. Prior to joining ACL in July 2016, Rhonda spent more than seven years managing Older Americans Act and other ACL programs at the Rhode Island Division of Elderly Affairs. Rhonda previously practiced law for sixteen years, specializing in commercial real estate transactions, before pursuing a Masters Degree in Social Work, focusing on older adults.

Administrator Long Meets with IAEM, starts Discovery Sessions

On Wednesday, August 9, Administrator Long had the opportunity to meet with the leadership from the International Association of Emergency Managers, one of FEMA’s long-standing partners, to discuss their ideas and priorities and to identify ways to continue to work together to improve emergency management across all levels.

On Thursday, August 10, Administrator Long kicked off the first of seven discovery sessions with FEMA employees and the agency's external stakeholders and partners. These sessions will begin a new cycle of inclusive listening for FEMA leadership, and will be key to developing a collective strategic plan.

FEMA Tribal Outreach and Consultation Period on FEMA Tribal Consultation Policy

FEMA will initiate a 90-day outreach and consultation period from **June 1 to August 29, 2017**, to seek input from federally recognized Indian tribal governments on the update of the agency's Tribal Consultation Policy. The [FEMA Tribal Consultation Policy](#), first issued in 2014, acknowledges the agency's nation-to-nation relationship with tribal governments. The policy also guides how FEMA engages tribal governments in regular and meaningful consultation and collaboration on policy and actions that have tribal implications.

This consultation period aims to update the policy to reflect current authorities and best practices, as well as follow FEMA's new policy document format requirements. FEMA seeks input and feedback from tribal leaders, or their designees, during the consultation period to help inform the development of an updated policy. 
FEMA Region II: Beach Safety Tips In the Sun

- Bring items to block the sun (hat, umbrella, sunglasses)
- Wear broad spectrum sunscreen at or above 30 SPF.
- Use sunscreen even when its cloudy!
- Reapply sunscreen every 2 hrs.
- Look out for sharp object on the beach if you're not wearing shoes.
- Keep Spray sunscreens away from your face

FEMA Region II: Beach Safety Tips In the Water



- Check weather conditions
- Have young/inexperienced swimmers wear lifejackets
- Watch young children and elderly persons, even in shallow water.
- Be respectful of aquatic life you encounter.
- Stay at least 100 ft. from piers & jetties to avoid rip currents.
- If in a rip current, don't fight it and swim parallel to shore until free

Important Deadlines

Comments Needed for Draft Policy on Floodplain Development

FEMA prepared a draft policy for FEMA staff and communities participating in the NFIP to update guidance for participating communities on satisfying National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) floodplain development permit requirements, and to address questions about floodplain permitting of development activities occurring in the FEMA designated Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA). Through this policy, a community can ensure compliance with NFIP and local floodplain management regulations, while potentially reducing the administrative burden associated with permitting certain types of low-to-no impact development in the floodplain.

This guidance does not intend to address other permits associated with building codes, or other federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial permits, and only applies to floodplain development permitting requirements to enroll in, and maintain eligibility for, the NFIP. The draft policy is available for review on FEMA's website at: <https://www.fema.gov/media-library/assets/documents/131010>, and the public is invited to provide comment and input via FEMA-Floodplain-Management-Division@fema.dhs.gov until **August 23, 2017**.

September 19, 20 & 21 2017, Virtual Exercise – Multiple Locations

Exercise Description:

This Virtual Tabletop Exercises (VTTX) will focus on an earthquake occurring in your community, using historical events and Hazus simulations.

The VTTX involves key personnel discussing simulated scenarios in an informal setting, and can be used to assess plans, policies, training, and procedures. This VTTX differs from other tabletop exercises in that it will be conducted using Video-Teleconference (VTC) technology (not a web-based program), and is intended to provide an opportunity for responders across the Nation to



Early-season Storms one Indicator of Active Atlantic Hurricane Season Ahead

The average Atlantic hurricane season has 12 named storms. According to [estimates from NOAA](#), this season is above-normal, with 14 to 19 named storms and 2-5 major hurricane hazards.

This is a boost from May, which predicted 11 to 17 named storms and 2-4 major hurricanes. NOAA says "the updated outlook is based on the current and evolving atmospheric and oceanic conditions, the most recent model predictions, and pre-and early-season storm activity." Planning to Recover from Emergencies at Districts and Schools
